

This map shows paths and routes around the village of Longniddry, which will enable you to get out and about and explore the village and its surrounding

Longniddry dates back at least to the 16th century. The earliest part of the village was most probably concentrated around John Knox's Kirk. Prehistoric and early Christian burial cists have been discovered at the junction of the coastal road and Lyars Road.

Close by along the spectacular coast you will find Longniddry Bents, Ferny Ness and Gosford Bay. They are all havens for wildlife and wild flowers, including wading birds, bloody cranesbill, clustered bellflower and cowslips. The woodland of Longniddry Dean is filled with birdsong in spring and summer

The John Muir Way runs along the dunes of Longniddry Bents and around Gosford Bay, providing spectacular views to the Firth of Forth. Nearby Gosford House and Grounds is an example of an 18th century designed landscape which was originally laid out in the 17th century.
