1. Briefly describe the policy/proposal you are assessing.

Set out a clear understanding of the purpose of the policy being developed or reviewed (e.g. objectives, aims) including the context within which it will operate.

Proposal to increase the number of approved foster carers to provide an additional 18 foster placements over 2 years. This will increase foster carer capacity and replace some of our most experienced foster carers who are retiring.

There is also a proposal to change our **Foster Carer Fee Payments** from a skills based progression through Level 1, Level 2, Level 3 – foster carers choosing whether to apply to the next level or not to Under 12 years Fee and Over 12 years Fee.

This would mirror the fee structure of our biggest competitor, City of Edinburgh Council and provide a financial incentive for foster carers to provide foster placements for older children. To achieve a reduction in the use of external foster and residential placements we must recruit, retain and support foster carers with an appetite to make a difference to the lives of our older children. This proposed change will require additional financial investment.

A change in the payment of Foster Carer Fees will have repercussions on our Share the Carer payments, (carers who provide short breaks family based care.) However, there is capacity in the existing Share the Care budget to make this change.

2. What will change as a result of this policy?

With the recruitment of more foster carers we should be able to make better placement matches and become more self- sufficient. This should result in a reduction to the External Placement Budget with our young people remaining in local placements and attending their local school.

Currently City of Edinburgh's fees are more attractive than ours. With the proposed increase in Foster Carer Fees prospective foster carers living in East Lothian will hopefully choose to foster with East Lothian.

More East Lothian Children enjoying short breaks with local Share the Carers.
