All protected characteristics will be present within the voting population.
Polling turnout data from 2017 shows consistently high turnout for all polling places — mid 50s to high 70%. Overall turnout 70.7%.
Direct contact with voters.
Feedback from poll staff/polling place inspectors.
Lets us know of any problems affecting voters ability to cast their vote (whether physical or administrative) or with premises or poll staff.
Gullane Hall – No indication from Roads re major roadworks affecting access to Village Hall, despite sending usual email asking for notification of any works at or around polling places. Caused difficulty for voters with cars, until we got signage sorted out. Apart from that, no major issues.

There are two areas of new housebuilding in North Berwick which currently overlap the polling district for North Berwick. It is proposed to make small alterations to the two polling district boundaries (Dirleton EL4C and Drem EL4D) to allow these to be included, with the rest of the new build area, in the polling district for North Berwick EL4E.

There is an overlap of a new build area at Dolphingstone, which affects Wallyford and Tranent. Unfortunately, the polling district boundary here can't be altered to allow the Tranent overlap to be included in the greater new build area of Wallyford ELMN3F. This is because the polling district boundary is also the Scottish Parliamentary boundary, which can't be altered. The proposal, therefore, is to alter the boundary between the two polling districts of Tranent, to allow the affected area to be included in the northern Tranent polling district EL3A. If the boundary was to remain as it is currently, any electors from the new build area would be obliged to vote at the Loch Centre (EL3B). The Loch Centre is already at capacity as a polling place, therefore, the best option is to change this to Tranent Town Hall, which can accommodate extra stations.
