All health and social care services in Scotland have a duty of candour. This is a legal requirement which means that when unintended or unexpected events happen that result in death or harm as defined in the Act, the people affected understand what has happened, receive an apology, and that organisations learn how to improve for the future.

An important part of this duty is that we provide an annual report about how the duty of candour is implemented in our services. This short report describes how East Lothian H&SCP Social Care Services has operated the duty of candour during the time between 1 April 2019 and 31 March 2020. We hope you find this report useful.

1. About East Lothian Health & Social Care Partnership (H&SCP)

East Lothian H&SCP serves a population of 107,090 (mid-2019 estimate¹) people across East Lothian. We cover a diverse geographical area, including large and small towns as well as rural areas. Our aim is to provide high quality care for every person who uses our services, and where possible help people to receive care at home or in a homely setting.

2. How many incidents happened to which the duty of candour applies?

Between 1 April 2019 and 31 March 2020, there were **no incidents** where the duty of candour applied. (These are unintended or unexpected incidents that result in death or harm as defined in the Act, and do not relate directory to the natural course of someone's illness or underlying condition.)

Through the adverse event process, we determine if there are factors that may have caused or contributed to an event, which helps to identify duty of candour incidents.
