SUBJECT: Scottish Government Consultation Paper on Housing

Support for Homeless Households

1 PURPOSE

1.1 To inform Cabinet of the Council's response to the Scottish Government's Consultation Paper on Housing Support for Homeless Households.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 Cabinet is recommended to note the contents of this Report and the Council's response to the proposals set out in the Consultation Paper, as detailed in the attached Appendix 1.

3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 When commenced, Section 32B of the Housing (Scotland) Act 1987 (inserted by the Housing (Scotland) Act 2010) will place a statutory duty on Local Authorities to assess the housing support needs of homeless applicants who are unintentionally homeless or threatened with homelessness and are in priority need. The Local Authority must then ensure that housing support services are provided to those assessed as being in need of them.
- 3.2 In addition to this duty, Section 32B allows Scottish Ministers to make regulations relating to the housing support assessment and provision, including:
 - The housing support services to be considered;
 - The conduct of the assessment by Local Authorities;
 - The provision of housing support services (which may include specifying the duration of service provision and matters to which a Local Authority must have regard); and

- Making different provision for different purposes and different areas.
- 3.3 The Scottish Government Consultation seeks views and proposals on making regulations on the requirement for Local Authorities to carry out an assessment for housing support for certain homeless applicants, or those who are threatened with homelessness, and to provide any necessary housing support.
- 3.4 The response submitted on behalf of East Lothian Council supports proposals to commence the duty on Local Authorities and establish regulations on the assessment and provision of housing support. It is considered that establishing regulations in relation to housing support would ensure that there is consistency in the delivery of housing support for homeless households.
- 3.5 The response is also supportive of Scottish Ministers prescribing the types of inquiries Local Authorities must carry out in determining the housing support required however it is noted this should provide a minimum baseline.
- 3.6 The response does not support the following proposals:
 - Scottish Ministers to prescribe the housing support services for which an applicant is to be assessed;
 - Scottish Ministers to specify the period for which housing support services should be provided;
 - Scottish Ministers specify matters to which a local authority is to have regard to when ensuring provision of housing support services; and
 - Scottish Ministers make different provision for different purposes and different areas.
- 3.7 The response also highlights the following issues for consideration in bringing forward the duty:
 - Definition: A statutory definition of housing support is required and is critical in bringing forward the duty.
 - Guidance: In addition to regulations, which provide the statutory framework for assessing housing support, good practice guidance should be provided to enable local authorities to further develop their response to assessing and delivering housing support.
 - Integration: Housing support should be linked to the delivery of other statutory support services and as far as possible assessment and delivery should be integrated and consistent.
 - Inter-agency: Regulations should include a duty to cooperate across statutory agencies.

CONSULTATION QUESTIONS

Local authorities will have a statutory duty under section <u>32B of The Housing</u> (<u>Scotland</u>) Act <u>1987 (inserted by The Housing (Scotland</u>) Act <u>2010</u>) to assess the housing support needs of homeless applicants who are unintentionally homeless, or threatened with homelessness, and are in priority need. They must also ensure that housing support services are provided to those assessed as being in need of them.

1. Policy options

In taking forward this policy, we must first establish which is the preferred option:

Option 1 Commence the duty on local authorities and establish regulations on the assessment and provision of housing support

Option 2 Commence the duty on local authorities and **do not** establish regulations on the assessment and provision of housing support

East Lothian Council welcomes the opportunity to respond to this consultation on housing support for homeless households. It is noted however that the Scottish Government have not provided a definition (or proposed definition) of housing support. This lack of definition makes it difficult for the Council to respond to the consultation fully. East Lothian Council consider a statutory definition of housing support to be critical in bringing forward the duty.

East Lothian Council considers that establishing regulations in relation to housing support would ensure that there is consistency in the delivery of housing support for homeless households. Regulations should provide the baseline for delivery and should not be overly prescriptive or constrain delivery.

It is recognised that guidance exists in relation to the eligibility criteria and waiting times for community care services. Regulations in relation to housing support could enable local authorities to deliver housing support services that are more comparable to other statutory support services and remove barriers for clients in accessing services.

2. Conducting the housing support needs assessment

Under Section 32B (2), local authorities will be required to assess whether the applicant, and any other person residing with the applicant, needs prescribed housing support services.

As stated under Section 32B (3	3))
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"In carrying out such an assessment, the local authority must: (a) conduct inquiries of such type as may be prescribed; and (b) have regard to any prescribed matters."

East Lothian Council considers that regulations should provide the minimum baseline in relation to inquiries that must be carried out.

East Lothian Council considers that prescribed inquiries should be based on accepted good practice, such as those detailed in answer to 2a. Any prescription must take cognisance of any agreed definition of housing support.

East Lothian Council have identified the staffing and resourcing of inquiries as having a potential business impact. It should be noted that East Lothian Council considers its current practice to be robust and therefore the impact of any prescribed inquiries is likely to be minimal.
Should the definition of housing support contain any elements not currently considered good practice this would be likely to increase the potential impact of making any inquiries.

3. Prescribing housing support services
Under section 32B (4), local authorities would have to ensure that prescribed housing support services are provided to any person assessed as being in need of them. Scottish Ministers can prescribe what these housing support services are.
Section 32(9) clarifies what "housing support services" covers:
"any service which provides housing support, assistance, advice, or counselling to an individual with particular needs with a view to enabling that individual to occupy, or to continue to occupy, residential accommodation as the individual's sole or main residence".
