### 1 PURPOSE

1.1 To report on considerations for future arrangements in administering Partnership Funding to external organisations and projects.

### 2 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 2.1 The voluntary effort in East Lothian has a huge impact upon the wellbeing of individuals and communities throughout the County. It is important that East Lothian Council ensures that a consistent regime is in place in administering Partnership Funding arrangements, in particular to ensure that such arrangements secure Best Value, and that practice conforms to guidance produced by the Accounts Commission and COSLA.
- 2.2 Members are, therefore, asked to note the proposals as set out in this report and remit officials, under the leadership of the Head of Policy & Partnerships, to implement those proposals.

### 3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 East Lothian Council manages and co-ordinates the processing and administration of grant awards to a significant and broad range of external organisations. To date in 2013/2014, the Council has awarded circa £5,003,381 in cash grants to external organisations. The scope of grant assistance offered ranges from modest awards to sums totalling almost £300,000 to individual organisations.
- 3.2 The arrangements for processing and administering grants to date have tended to follow custom and practice within the host Department service responsible for administering particular grant portfolios. In the interest of providing greater scrutiny of grant arrangements and ensuring that the

principles of Best Value are adhered to at all times, it was considered appropriate to conduct a review of the administration arrangements and develop a more strategic and co-ordinated approach. Such arrangements will ensure that the process for applicants is also much clearer and provides greater transparency and consistency in the manner in which applications for financial assistance are considered, evaluated, recommended, monitored and further reported upon.

- 3.3 The Council appreciates that the support provided can be crucial to the existence of external organisations. However, it is also recognised that the Council has a duty to safeguard the interest of the taxpayer by *Following the Public Pound*.
- 3.4 As the Council has been developing further elements of financial support arrangements, particularly in Adult Wellbeing and Children's Wellbeing where a procurement strategy has been followed, officers have seen the need to be more specific, in terms of what the Council expects in return for its award of financial assistance/investment.
- 3.5 In reviewing past and existing arrangements, a Short Life Working Group has been established, led by the Head of Policy & Partnerships and comprising representatives from all Council functions that have an interest and involvement in grant administration. The purpose and scope of the Group is to review Partnership Funding activity across the Council, with a view to rationalising arrangements to ensure the Council follows best practice, as contained within guidance produced by the Accounts Commission and COSLA. The primary focus of the Short Life Working Group is to:-
  - Establish a single portal for all applicants approaching the Council for grant / financial assistance. It is considered that the most logical portal for entry to the Council for such assistance or advice and guidance would be through Policy & Partnerships.
  - Create a set of documentation to be consistently applied across all grant and external funding arrangements. New model documentation has been produced comprising an Application Form, Application Guidance, Evaluation and End of Project Form Report.
  - Seek to ensure that in considering recommendations for financial awards primary consideration is given to activities that focus upon prevention activity, e.g. early intervention initiatives, alignment with the Single Outcome Agreement, alignment with the Council Plan, targeting community infrastructure weaknesses that emerge from Local Area Partnership intelligence, and ensuring that funding activity aligns very clearly with the Council's drive towards Local Area Management arrangements.
- 3.6 An analysis has been undertaken of allocations that have been approved by Cabinet for 2013/2014:-

3.7 Further examination has, however, been undertaken to identify areas where funding duplication has arisen across services and sectoral support. For example, Advisory Services, who are in receipt of Council financial assistance. <u>Appendix 1</u> details the analysis of funding allocations in 2013/2014.

3.8 As can be seen from the detail in the Appendix, there are a number of areas and sectors that the Council supports where duplication arises in particular service areas; e.g. Advisory Services, where more co-ordinated financial assistance arrangements would yield greater efficiency and effectiveness.

- 3.9 It is intended that engagements with a range of organisations will take place over the summer months to identify where greater synergy can be secured and potentially move some of what has historically been grant funding activity onto a commissioning and procurement footing. For example, a review of Advisory Service support is about to commence.
- 3.10 Key to such activity will not only be in ensuring that the Council follows best practice in relation to Best Value considerations, but also in driving greater efficiency and contribution from organisations that the Council supports and, in so doing, securing stepped reductions in the Council's overall Partnership Funding budgetary provision for financial years 2014/2015 and beyond.
- 3.11 As mentioned previously, the starting point to drive reductions in Partnership Funding will be to pay close attention to organisations that seek financial assistance in determining their activity, initiative contribution to **prevention**, **early intervention**, alignment with the **Single Outcome Agreement** and **Council Plan** priorities (Council Plan priorities being Growing the Economy; Growing our People; Growing our Communities).
- 3.12 It is important to note that organisations who cannot demonstrate a contribution towards meeting such priority criteria may fail to secure financial assistance. In such circumstances, it is essential that early engagement with those organisations takes place as soon as possible, and well in advance of funding provision for 2014/2015.

## 4 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

4.1 In providing financial support to external organisations and the voluntary sector in East Lothian, the Council requires to ensure that the contribution and activities of such organisations adhere to the **Single Outcome Agreement** priorities, the **Council Plan** priorities and Council Business Group function objectives.

## 5 EQUALITIES IMPACT ASSESSMENT

5.1 An Equalities Impact Assessment has been undertaken in examining the process of administering Partnership Funding to external organisations.

## 6 **RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS**

6.1 **Financial** - As noted in this report, the financial contribution to external organisations thus far in 2013/2014, by way of Partnership Funding, amounts to some £5 million. In applying the criteria as proposed in the report, it is intended to drive reductions in Partnership Funding budgetary provision whilst at the same time seeking to secure greater efficiency and

effectiveness from the organisations that are in receipt of assistance from the Council.

- 6.2 **Personnel** It is intended that arising from the review of Policy & Strategy functions within the Council, an existing Policy & Strategy Officer be identified to take primary responsibility for driving forward the recommendations and proposals within this report.
