**SUBJECT:** Revisions to Non-Residential Charges for 2017/18

#### 1 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to make revisions to existing charges for Non-Residential Social Care Services. These revisions are required to fulfil the Administration's budget commitment to generate and additional £25,000 from charges in 2017/18. These revisions have been made under delegated powers in accordance with the Council's Scheme of Delegation.

#### 2 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 Members are asked to note the revised charges for Non-Residential Social Care Services.

#### 3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The Administration budget for 2017/18 was approved on 21 February 2016. This contained a commitment to increase existing charges for non-residential social care services that would generate £25,000 income in the financial year.
- 3.2 A Charging Working Group comprising of representatives of service users, carers and representing organisations working alongside Council Officers has been meeting and working on developing a new Charging Policy which will bring the previous policy up to date and ensure that it is compliant with COSLA guidance on charging for non-residential care services.
- 3.3 It should be noted that the proposed £% uplift on three existing charges coincides with an increase in the Charging Threshold from 16.5% to 25% which will in turn protect more of a person's income from any means testing for eligibility to pay charges.

3.4 The following revisions to existing charges are being made under delegated powers. These changes will be communicated to affected service users at the earliest opportunity giving appropriate 28 days notice of the change and implemented thereafter.
