	NM welcomed everyone to the meeting and noted apologies.

3.	Update on Covid related issues a. L Buchan – COPFS LB advised that at the start of the Covid outbreak in March, only 12 Courts were open across Scotland. Edinburgh Sheriff court was open and covering business for Livingstone, Selkirk and Jedburgh courts. These courts opened again over June and August to resume summary business including trials, deferrals and Justice of the Peace business. Meanwhile 'cinema' models have been tested to hold cases. This involves cases being heard in actual cinemas where there is enough space to allow for social distancing. The Lothian and Borders courts are to resume Jury business in the near future once models have been tested for appropriate security and public access issues. There is a considerable backlog of solemn and summary business. LB mentioned that the Justice Committee had just published a report on the safe reopening of solemn courts and included recommendations of virtual courts and using live links from St Leonard's police station. LB then invited question from members: FO'D asked if there were any types of cases that were being prioritised by the Courts such as domestic abuse case? LB replied that yes, they were trying to prioritise domestic abuse case including breaches of conditions. JT asked what the back log of cases meant for community justice and for people delivering services? Asking what we could be putting in place to support people; unable to move on due to their cases not being heard, missing opportunities for critical interventions, and the longer term impacts this will have on offenders and their families. LB replied they were keen to get back to business and were exploring a number of ways in which they could do this through various national groups and testing new models of delivery. LB acknowledged that the impact of delays would be very hard for some people and their families.	

IG asked about unpaid work delays and how this backlog could be cleared. TC advised that JM was working with relevant parties to put measures in place to support getting through the backlog. LB added that were committees working nationally and it is important that Local Authorities voices are heard in national discussions.	
NM asked if there had been any reduction in thresholds on what cases the courts would proceed with. LB advised that no instructions have been made at this point but that this might change.	LB to double check warrant issues had be resolved.
NM also asked if the delay in warrants being issued had been resolved. LB advised that yes they had but would double check this.	
NM then asked what might change due to Covid in terms of Court provisions? LB answered that review were currently taking place and that pilot models were being tested using secure sites as staff still needed to be present for victims. Models were being tested that allow partner agencies to give evidence from their own site (i.e. police giving evidence from police stations and medics from hospital) but this would be different from members of the public giving evidence and they would need to ensure that any IT being used was secure.	
DA added that Covid and the early prisoner release scheme had a limited impact on the number of people from East Lothian in prison and that the number of EL prisoners had sat around 70 since last year even though there had a been a great variance in the number of people in prison after the early release scheme. DA added that prisoner numbers were now increasing with a considerable number of people coming in on remand (which was very low at the start of the Covid outbreak). LB added that Court processes with the prison were now much slicker but still need to improve as there has been a return to normal life in relation to community crime but the courts still have a much reduced capacity to deal with people who have offended. DA added there were people in prison who had been on remand for 14 months and these were mostly domestic abuse cases. LB advised that 20 people accused pre Covid that were still on remand. DA updated that there were 24 people from EL on remand and 71 prisoners in total. 4 of these were young offenders, 2 were on home curfew and 27 were long term prisoners (with sentences of 4 years or more).	
NM asked LB if there was anything the CJP could do to support the Court system and LB replied that she would ask the Barr Association this when they next meet.	
LB talked about the mental health intervention project currently being delivered in Edinburgh and Livingstone police cells. The 3 year project has been running for approx. 4 weeks and offers direct access to mental health nurses for people arrested.	
NM thanked LB for attending the meeting.	
b. All CJ Partners – Updates	

NM asked JT what information we currently had in relation to children & young people and Covid. JT replied that the evidence coming from services was there had been considerable negative impacts on some young people. The lack of structure had affected a number of young people and impacted on their mental health putting them at risk of, and compromising the safety of people they come in to contact with. There were also challenges in supported units with staff trying to keep young people in and sticking to the Covid legislation. Staff were also concerned about the loss of face to face contact there had been some IT issues impacting on meetings and reviews.	
JT went on to say that we know who these children are from a very early age and that we need universal services and a multi-agency approach to support them. JT mentioned that East Renfrewshire hadn't had a single child in secure care for the last 6 years. NM suggested LB looked at this issue through the Early Intervention and Prevention workstream.	LB to follow this up with the EI&P workstream
EM added Skills Development Scotland (SDS) were seeing an increase in youth unemployment and were taking a targeted approach to working with school leavers. EM added that school leavers with limited home support were struggling to find positive destinations to move on to. EM has been working with Y Binks (ELC Education) to increase the attendance of young people using the Spark of Genius service, and have a tailored programme in place to support this.	
It was noted that there had been an increase in redundancies affecting parents and children.	
CM added that there had been a recent investment in school counselling services and the recruitment of 6 mental health officers was now underway. JT said that L Binnie (ELC Education) is the contact for this service. NM added that the police were seeing an increase in youth related disorder in Musselburgh and Dunbar. There has also been an increase in ASB, and officers were working with Recharge in Tranent and the Bridges project in Musselburgh to resolve this.	
JT added that the Children Strategic Partnership Plan had 3 strategic Priorities in it which focus on: mental health, family and parenting support, and reducing inequalities.	
MA mentioned that VCEL have an outdoor centre which is not currently being utilised. MA/ TC/ JT agreed to discuss this out with the meeting.	MA/TC to discuss
MB updated the partnership on the work of MELD(AP) and that during the early stages of the Covid crisis that medication had been delivered direct to peoples doors. He also reported there had been an increase in ad-hoc drug use and they had been promoting the "stick don't twist" message to reduce poly/ multi-drug use. There has also been a benzodiazipan subgroup set up. The service had also worked closely
