3.	Update of CJP Role and Remit, and Membership	
	SK talked members through the proposal to amend the CJP existing 'role and remit' paper to allow for the addition of new members. The existing role and remit allowed for a maximum of 17 members and SK noted that other organisations had expressed an interest in joining the CJP. She requested that the members have a look at the proposed changes and get back to her with their agreement via email.	SK
4.	Community Justice Local Outcome Improvement Plan 2021-24 (CJ LOIP)	
	SK talked through the draft CJ LOIP 2021-2024, giving the background to the activities leading up to the development of the LOIP. Notably, these were the Transitional LOIP which covers the period from 2021-2021 (where the previous version of the LOIP had expired) and the Self-Evaluation and Validation processes, supported by the Care Inspectorate, which resulted in the Improvement Action Plan.	
	a. Sign off Transitional LOIP	
	SK talked through the 4 actions within the Transitional LOIP, explaining that they were all either complete, or due to be completed by June 2021. SK highlighted that there had been a number of consultation and engagement	

	activities during the last two years with people using Community Justice services, and their input had helped shape the LOIP for 2021-2024. More detail on this engagement can be found in the "Participation Statement" appendix 7, of the draft LOIP. Members approved the completion of the Transitional LOIP with a view any outstanding actions are recorded in the new version of the LOIP. b. Review of the Self-Evaluation and Validation Improvement Action Plan Members approved the new dates in Improvement Action Plan which had been modified in light of the Covid 19 pandemic.	
	c. Draft CJ LOIP 2021-2024	
	SK talked through the draft LOIP and made specific reference to section 3, which is the "Our Approach Section", as this was the part that framed the ethos of the CJP and gave the direction moving forward for the role of the Community Justice Coordinator. It focused on using current evidence on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), Trauma Informed Practice, Whole Systems Approaches and the research around Severe and Multiple Disadvantage (SMD) (from the Hard Edges Scotland report) to form a supporting ethos that framed our aspirations to deliver 'smarter justice – better outcomes'. Section 4 of the draft LOIP highlighted the current demand on our Community Justice Services and how this data helped to update the actions in the workstreams as detailed in section 5, 'Our Improvement Actions'. SK and NM asked that all feedback on the draft be forwarded by 12th April.	Feedback to be sent to SK/NM
	d. Public consultation	
	NM asked the members for suggestions on how to take forward the public consultation on the LOIP and the below actions were agreed:	SK/NM

5.	Trauma Training	
	JT confirmed that this was going to be a slow process due to the number of staff and the level of training required. All partnership members were asked to provide JT with any good suggestions/practice currently used within their departments, which they felt would be useful.	All
	Updates from Workstream Leads	JT
	a. Getting it Right to Reduce Reoffending	,
	NS informed the partnership that the group met on Friday 22nd January and the next meeting is due to take place on Tuesday 11^{th} May. The Housing First final protocol is to be confirmed mid April, and rolled out as of 1^{st} May. NS hopes to have some positive feedback regarding this at the next meeting.	

	NC mentioned that the Mental Health and Substance Misuse team had received funding from the workstream.	
	b. Early Intervention & Prevention	
	AJ provided a brief update. The workstream last met on Tuesday 23 rd February 2021. The Mental Health and Wellbeing services are continuing to work remotely (via phone/email). She informed the partnership that the six new youth mental health workers had settled into the local high schools, and were trying to resume some sense of normality. A new website has been created regarding mental health for young people. AJ offered to circulate the link to the website if any members were interested in having a look. The next workstream meeting is scheduled for Wednesday 5 th May. NM mentioned that he was currently working with SS's and JT's teams in order to tackle youth related disorder. Recently there had been several violent incidents reported of youths vandalising the local buses. This time last year, local youths were socially gathering in their hundreds, going against government guidelines. There were also incidents reported, in which, the use of Nitrous Oxide canisters occurred.	
	c. Community Engagement	AJ
	CW informed members that the Street Cones workshops started at the end of March and that people with outstanding Unpaid Work Hours were attending. They are still awaiting a final date for the production but a small number of people will be invited to attend the show.	
	£4000 funding has been given to Heavy Sound, to take forward a Peer Mentoring project and a manager starts post in April.	
	There are plans to update ELC community justice webpages and the work proposed for a prison leavers guide is on hold for the minute.	CW/CMC
	It was suggested that it might be worthwhile to create something which would promote the successes of the Workstreams, for example, a newsletter.	
6.	Long term substance misuse a. Drug Deaths Task Force	
	IG informed the partnership that a meeting had been held with partner services across the region. After the success of Police Scotland's Operation Juneau last summer, it was agreed, in the short term, to provide an alcohol/misuse service. This would initially last 3 to 6 months and then be subject to review. This service is to be known as the Alcohol and Drugs Harm Group (not the Drug Deaths Task Force).	
	DA & IG agreed to have a further discussion regarding people leaving prison (near miss occurrence – drugs).	DA/IG
