1.	NM welcomed everyone to the meeting and noted apologies.	
	June minutes agreed as an accurate reflection of the last meeting.	
2.	National Community Justice Agenda (CJ Scotland)	
	NM introduced KMcC, Chief Executive (Community Justice Scotland) to the meeting. KMcC talked the members through the following presentation 'Communication Insight: Making Community Justice Visible in Scotland'. She shall send a copy of this presentation to SK after today's meeting to share with the partnership.	KMcC/SK
	CJ Scotland are keen to establish what the public know about community justice in their local areas. An independent research agency called 'Progressive', conducted research with residents across the six sheriffdoms to measure awareness of local community justice projects. It was revealed that the Lothian and Borders area had the highest awareness of community justice. However, residents were unclear as to what the term actually means. NM stressed how important it was to inform the local area about community justice. He went on to say that the care consultation could be implemented as part of the action plan for the Community Engagement workstream. KMcC discussed the work of the "godfather of community justice", author	KMcC/DA
	Todd R Clear. She offered to send DA a copy of his book, 'Imprisoning Communities: How Mass Incarceration Makes Disadvantaged Neighbourhoods Worse'. She also sent him a link to this via the Teams meeting chat box.	KMcC/DA
	JG raised that a lot of housing problems which have arisen are related to antisocial behaviour. This behaviour stems from the mental health issues experienced by either the perpetrator or the victim. Many young people can suffer from mental health issues, which sadly can result in them becoming involved in community justice in later life.	
	PV mentioned that he was currently working on the Residents Survey. This shall provide the local community with the opportunity to tell East Lothian Council how they feel about their community, health, economic situation and public services, as well as how they have been affected by the ongoing pandemic. DA offered to help facilitate contact with residents who are currently in prison.	
	NM thanked KMcC on for taking the time to talk to the partnership today. He opened the floor to give the members the chance to put forward any questions they may have had. KMcC agreed to have further, individual discussions with both ME and SA at a later date.	KMcC/ME/SA

4.	Updates from Workstream Leads	
	a. Getting it Right to Reduce Reoffending	
	Unfortunately, NS was unable to attend the meeting. However, the following update was provided on her behalf by AL:	
	There have been several meetings recently in relation to developing a protocol for a preventative pathway for people leaving prison. The development work has almost concluded, with the new approach to commence from the end of September. This shall result in a focus on people entering, rather than leaving prison, which shall, in turn, hopefully prevent anyone leaving prison from requiring a homeless assessment and sustaining/obtaining appropriate housing at an earlier stage.	
	Discussions are currently ongoing with partner organisations (i.e. Cyrenians, Circle and the Bridges Project) to assist with specific aspects of early intervention, holistic support for families and tenancy support/resettlement. Significant funding has been made available from Homelessness (Rapid	

e	Rehousing Transition Plan funding) for proposed new projects which shall enable an increased package of support to assist with the reducing reoffending agenda.	
9	Both the Scottish Government and the Scottish Prison Service (Liz Cooper, Strategy) are aware of this new approach and agree with the plans to date, which indicates that East Lothian are leading the way on this.	
r r i	JM and DA have had a few discussions recently regarding the number of EL residents being released from prison. There are currently 63 men from EL remanded/ in custody. AL shall send NM a copy of the prison release information which JSWS receives weekly. KMcC also offered to send NM information regarding arrest warrants.	AL/NM KMcC/NM
	NS has not had the time recently to prepare the paper on local connection. However, she can confirm that the goalposts have changed slightly:	
i 5 7 7 8 8 8 8 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9 9	The new Programme for Government was published in early September, and includes the proposed legislation around Bail and Release from Custody. This shall reflect the ongoing issues with the numbers in prison, the capacity of prisons and the significant proportion of those incarcerated being held on remand without a conviction. Alternatives to custody being offered are likely to involve an increased use of electronic monitoring and home detention curfews. The Bill shall include reforms to support release arrangements, with a focus on enabling reintegration into the community. Housing shall have a role to play in respect of this. NS understands that there are discussions taking place within CJ nationally regarding a support service which includes housing issues linked to the liberation process in both the courts and police custody. These discussions shall need to acknowledge the proposed changes in local connection and ensure that links here shall be key to ensuring an appropriate approach that shall, in turn, take into account any key issues and concerns going forward.

t c ł	AJ informed the partnership that since the last meeting, a lot of progress has been made within the workstream. This has been helped with both the easing of the pandemic restrictions and the schools returning following the summer holidays. It is likely that there shall be more opportunities to interact with young people on a face to face basis now that the restrictions have eased.	
a e r	All areas appear to be making good progress and services, particularly those around mental health awareness and support, which have now been well embedded and widely utilised. An evaluation is due to be carried out with regards to the Wellbeing Academy, from which the findings shall be used to inform future service delivery.	
r	AJ went on to say that they have had some guest speakers along to last few meetings. These presentations were very informative and have possibly opened up further avenues for early intervention and prevention work:	
	• Anne-Marie McRae (Speech therapist and Doctorate Student from QMU) spoke about how language and speech difficulties can make it difficult for young people to understand the justice system and implications of their actions.	

•	Donald Lockhart ('Fast Forward') has been delivering 'Going Forward'	
	sessions since May 2017. The service has been working closely with the Bridges Project in Musselburgh to deliver sessions to support	
	young people to make safe and healthy choices.	
•	Kirsten Kidd (Childrens' worker for the Caledonian Project) spoke about the effects domestic abuse can have on young people who witness it, and how the trauma can lead them into making unhealthy choices.

Development of an offence-focused module to be delivered by JSW to

module has now been developed and is currently being reviewed by the	
JSWS team. They plan to start using this module from the 1 st October. SM

Structured Deferred Sentences (SDS) - SACRO have been contracted by the	
JSWS team to assess how SDS might be developed. They shall provide a	
report covering this and give some pointers on how we might best develop SDS locally.	
Development of in-house modules to be delivered as part of 'other activity' for those subject to Community Payback Order - A Citizenship Module is	
currently being developed by Alison Lynch of the JSWS team, which shall be delivered by social work assistants. All service users sentenced to unpaid	
work have the opportunity to do a 16 hour learning pack at home which covers topics such as identifying and managing emotions, healthy living etc.	
c. Community Engagement	
The Street Cones performance and livestream have both taken place since the last CJP meeting. Links to both the read-through and livestream have been previously circulated to all worksteam members by SK. JSWS have	
recently received the final evaluation report from Street Cones. CW shall send out a copy of this to all workstream members in due course. Despite the	
small number of participants, the feedback was extremely positive. Two service users are to be approached to see whether they would be willing to	
participate in a longitudinal study following the outcomes of JSW service users. JSWS have a meeting planned with the ELC Arts Service in November to discuss how to develop more creative responses for unpaid work in East Lothian.

additional Social Work Assistant post (to directly support the CPW Team Leader) also has a preferred candidate and recruitment is underway. CPW	
Supervisors are now instructing five people per van per day. The Heavy Sound Bike Project resumed on 23 rd of August at the Peffermill workshop and	
shall continue for the next 12 weeks. VCEL have been approached to identify/create 15 new unpaid work placements in the county between now and the end of March.	
Malky Paul (Heavy Sound Peer Mentoring Manager) has circulated referral forms for mentors and mentees. Referrals have been made by JSWS to the
