I acknowledge that the submission of this report is outside the statutory reporting time scale given by the Act. As such I respectfully request that the Licensing Board relieve this failure under Section 135 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. The circumstances reported below have only come to light in the last few days and so could not be reported earlier. I believe it is important for the consideration of the above occasional licences that members consider the content of this report.

If accepted, please read this additional report alongside my previous report submitted 8th September 2025.

On 20th September I received information that there was an event held earlier that day at La Trattoria advertised as a Boozy Brunch and that photos and videos of the event showing consumption of alcohol had been posted on social media. In addition, I was informed that alcohol has been advertised on the Facebook page for the premises. At this time, I submitted an online report to police Scotland detailing another potential Section 1 Licensing (Scotland) Act offence, the unlicensed sale of alcohol.

On 22nd September, I requested an open-source search be conducted by East Lothian Corporate Communications Department for the advertisement of the Boozy Brunch event and any evidence of alcohol advertising or consumption from 28th August until present day.

The attached screenshots of post on Facebook were returned – see Images 1-10

On the La Trattoria Facebook page a post was found advertising an BoozéBrunch event as shown in Image 1. The event was advertised to take place on 20th September between 12noon – 4pm and the offer included a glass of prosecco on arrival, 3 cocktails and a selection of food for £45. Live music was also advertised. Within the comments section shown in Image 2, an individual asks if the event is fully booked and this is confirmed that by La Trattoria. In addition, it is confirmed in the comments that a deposit of £20pp is required.

Images 4-7 show patrons with cocktails that appear to have been made on the premises being consumed. In addition, there appears to be a member of staff in Image 3 standing with a tray of wine/prosecco to serve to patrons. There is no evidence from these photos that this is a BYOB event, and it would be impossible for patrons to have made the cocktails that are on the tables. On the tables there appears to be other bottles of wine that have been sold in addition to the offer.

Image 4 shows the applicant Ms Pacitti is shown to be present at the event.

There were also videos present on social medial showing the restaurant at capacity with patrons consuming cocktails, wine and what appears to be prosecco. There appears to have been entertainment at the venue with live music. At times photos and videos shows patrons dancing on chairs. This is something I would discourage at all premises as unsafe.

Screenshots from the Facebook page for La Trattoria were also reviewed please see Images 8 - 10. There are 3 posts advertising cocktails namely Amalfi breeze containing Aperol posted on 9th September, Paloma containing tequila posted on 14th September and Espresso Martini containing vodka posted on 20th September. These adverts for alcohol have been posted during a time when the premises has not been licensed under an occasional licence. The Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 defines "sell" as - in relation to alcohol, includes barter and expose to or offer for sale, and related expressions such as "sale" are to be construed accordingly. The post of the Amalfi breeze was posted one day after Ms Pacitti had been asked to cease all sales of alcohol until an occasional licence was granted.

The advertisement of the cocktails is a clear offer of sale during an unlicensed period.

On the balance or probabilities given the information above I believe that sales of alcohol have taken place without a licence. There is nothing to indicate that the cocktails provided, and other drinks have been non-alcoholic and the advertisement of the event details the supply of alcohol.

Currently, a provisional premises licence is held for the above premises that was granted in April 2025. The licence holder is Paola Crolla, the applicant Natascia Pacitti is the business operator.

All the information contained in this report has been submitted to Police Scotland prior to this board hearing. The officer dealing with the enquiry has requested that I do not contact Natascia Pacitti or Paolo Crolla until Police have contacted them.

I ask the board to consider if Ms Pacitti is a fit and proper person to be granted these occasional licences. On 8th September Ms Pacitti was asked to cease all sales of alcohol until an occasional licence was granted, however there has been a continued offer for sale and what appear to be sales of alcohol at the premises. This has shown a disregard for the licensing regime and clear issues with Ms Pacitti and her mother Ms Crolla's understanding of licensing legislation. This includes the difference between a provisional premises licence and a premises licence and the requirement for occasional licences. Ms Pacitti's conduct has been inconsistent with the licensing objectives. Selling alcohol without a licence is a serious offence which carries significant penalties. I ask the board to consider if Ms Pacitti can be trusted going forward to adhered to the licensing objectives and ask that the grounds for refusal under section 59(6)(c) are considered:

(6) The grounds for refusal are—

(c) that the Licensing Board considers the granting of the application would be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives,

I suggest that no further occasional licences are issued to Ms Pacitti or for this premises until Police Scotland can carry out and conclude a full investigation. I submit this for the Board's information in determining the occasional licence applications.




